

In March of 2020 when the Covid19 Pandemic swept through and spread like wildfire, our rehearsal space was shut down for what was to be two weeks. Little did we know that it would remain shutdown indefinitely and over a year later we would just begin rehearsing together in person - with full pandemic safety protocols - in a city picnic shelter. It's not much, but at least it is SOMETHING!

Last March as all of this began sinking in and schools went into a remote learning mode we quietly began meeting remotely as well, planning to "ride it out" for a few more weeks. We dreamed of soon going back to in-person rehearsals to keep our repertoire fresh and polish it for a glorious final season concert event, complete with annual awards and reception in early May. Then it became apparent this would not be happening for a very, very, long time.


So we went into different mode of awards, mailing out participation certificates, hand-delivering trophies and special roses in front yards, and arranged a "drive-by" celebration for our high school senior. We extended the season a few weeks then finally had to finish with an online celebration event with slide shows and videos.

Our big tour to the Crescent City Children's Choir Festival in New Orleans in June was cancelled, Summer Sing Day-Camp didn't happen in August, and we were faced with starting a new season with virtual auditions and more virtual rehearsals. This was all done with no small amount of *freaking out about EVERYTHING just like* every other perform-



ing arts organization on the entire planet! After checking in with friends and colleagues in the children's choir community for support encouragement, we began to think differently:

instead of what we can't do, what CAN we do????

Our Parent Board met early last May and deemed that *our bonds are greater than just the act of singing together*, and decided that we needed to remain connected and focus on social-emotional learning aspects to keep supporting our singers. Therefore our 2020-2021 Season began last September with great anticipation, keeping the following goals in mind:



- To provide a place for our singers to experience fun and joy and share their love of singing and music with other like-minded girls and young women.
- Staying connected with our singers, both individually, and as a group. *Connection is key.*
- To develop our singers' musicianship skills to a much higher level than what we are normally able to do in a performance-based setting.
- Connect with others outside of our own choir, creating an even greater sense of community.
- Be set-up and ready once we ARE able to meet together in-person!

WSGC has been doing this all season long, meeting weekly in a virtual format, having a few combined chorus online socials along the way, and producing three "Virtual Choir Videos" to share with others through social media. And now, finally, we are starting back in person in a city covered picnic shelter until Centenary UMC opens back up. It will still be quite awhile until we won't need to wear a singer mask and follow COVID19 Safety protocols, **BUT THAT'S OKAY**. In the meantime we are now making music together and looking forward to even brighter days ahead.—Anne

A Year of Virtual Choir

When the pandemic began last year and it was not safe to sing together in person, we started meeting virtually on Zoom each week and did as much as possible to stay connected and keep our singers engaged. There was no way to sing together simultaneously, so we had to be creative and resourceful, "building our ship" each week as we worked to keep our music and connection alive.

We implemented different ways of engagement with things like "hat dav", a masked singer event. creating choir memes, and playing games, such as Solfege Bingo. Since September we have distributed choir materials on 3 different occasions with things needed at home to use while in rehearsal. These included copies of the music, solfege and musicianship materials, and things for Dalcroze creative movement, such as scarves and racket balls.
